UGR BUDDY PROGRAM

The programme kicks off in September every year and normally runs for a semester or full academic year. The UGR's International Office will pair you up with a UGR mentor, prior to your arrival, from the faculty or school where you will be undertaking your studies. Your mentor or buddy will provide you with on-going support both before and during your time at our University. They will help you with everything from completing administrative procedures, searching for accommodation, and finding your way around the University campuses and Granada. They will also organize cultural activities such as visits to monuments and historical sites; guided tours; excursions; concerts; plays etc. (you can decide on these activities with your mentor).

HOUSING

Finding accommodation in the city of Granada is not a very big issue. Usually, there are many types of accommodation for international students-don't forget that Granada is the number #1 receiving Erasmus in Europe! So, renting a flat is not difficult at all, but you won't always find what you were looking for. It depends on your budget, preferred location and facilities, but generally there won't be any problems. Granada has plenty of shared flats for students, local and international; the city's lifestyle goes around the University. The average would be 300€ for a student flat room in university neighbourhoods. If your budget is lower, you can move to the outskirts for 180-200€.

There are also housing groups and platforms, such as the ones run by ESN Granada (**Erasmus Student Network**), which really help international students to find a flat for their exchange semester or year. During the first days of the semester, also known as Welcome Days, international students can meet new people and immerse themselves in the vibrant atmosphere of Granada.

FLYING TO GRANADA

The cheapest and nearest airport to fly to is Málaga, but you can also check for flights to Granada directly or to Almería. **Ryanair** would probably be the cheapest option, and Erasmus Student Network also offers discounts with Ryanair (10% off and checked-inluggage for free), so if you consider it an option don't hesitate to drop them a message.



ACADEMIC INFORMATION

The school's four-year curriculum (Degree of Translation and Interpreting) and five-year curriculum (Double Degree of Translation and Tourism) comply with the European higher education framework. The teaching modules follow the European Credit Transfer System (ECTS), facilitating exchanges with other universities abroad.

Full time study is equivalent to 30 ECTS per semester. One academic year is 60 ECTS.
Spanish marks: 10 is the highest mark. 5/10 is the minimum passing mark.

ESTIMATED COST OF LIVING (per month)
